

**NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF A BY-LAW
BY THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF BARRIE
TO REGULATE LAND USE PURSUANT TO
SECTION 34(18) OF THE PLANNING ACT, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13**

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Barrie has passed **By-law Number 2026-076** on Wednesday, June 17, 2026 pursuant to the provision of *Section 34(18) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990 c. P.13*.

AND TAKE NOTICE that By-law Number 2026-076 is in accordance with Direction Number MDIR007-26, under Bill 3, the *Strong Mayors, Building Homes Act, 2022*, in accordance with subsections 284.11.1(1)(b) and 284.11.1(2) of the *Municipal Act, 2001*.

THE PURPOSE AND EFFECT of By-law Number 2026-076 is to amend By-law Number 2009-141 to delete and replace the first paragraph of section 4.2.1 of 4.2 Permitted Uses as follows:

- 4.2.1 Notwithstanding anything contained in this By-law, any *public utility* or service owned and operated by the City of Barrie, as well as any uses or facilities required to support *sovereign defence*, as approved by the City, Province, or Federal government, shall not be subject to the provisions and standards of this Zoning By-law, save and except as provided in Section 11 of this By-law.

And add the following definition to the defined terms set out in Section 3.0 Definitions:

Sovereign Defence

“Shall mean the domestic capability to independently research, develop, test, manufacture, assemble, maintain, repair, upgrade, store, and sustain advanced technologies, products, equipment, and systems that support Canada’s ability to protect its territory, infrastructure, and population, and to maintain long-term operational readiness, without reliance on foreign production or sustainment for essential capabilities. Sovereign defence capabilities are those without which Canada cannot defend its sovereignty or meet its allied commitments. To qualify, a capability must be critical to the ability to defend Canada; an area of strength in Canada or have the potential to be one; and in demand by our Allies and partners to support collective defence and enable exports”.

A copy of the By-law is available for viewing in the office of the City Clerk between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday to Friday. A key map is provided with this Notice showing the location of the lands affected by By-law Number 2026-076.

IF YOU WISH TO APPEAL the decision of the City of Barrie to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT) in respect to the By-law, you may do so within twenty (20) days of the issuance of this notice by filing a Notice of Appeal via the OLT e-file at <https://olt.gov.on.ca/e-file-service/> by selecting [*City of Barrie*] as the Approval Authority or by mail to the City Clerk – City of Barrie, no later than 4:30 p.m. on or before **Sunday, July 12, 2026**. The filing of an appeal after 4:30 p.m., in person or electronically, will be deemed to have been received the next business day. If the e-file portal is down, you can submit your appeal to: OLT.submissions@barrie.ca. WHO CAN FILE AN APPEAL

Pursuant to Section 34(19) of the *Planning Act R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13*, a Notice of Appeal may be filed to the OLT by the following parties:

- The Applicant;
- A specified person who, prior to Council's decision, made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council of the City of Barrie;
- A public body who, prior to Council's decision, made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council of the City of Barrie;
- The registered owner who, prior to Council's decision, made oral submissions at a public meeting or written submissions to the Council of the City of Barrie;
- The Minister.

No person or public body shall be added as a party to the hearing of the appeal unless, before the by-law was passed, the person or public body made oral submissions at the public meeting or written submissions to the Council of the City of Barrie or, in the opinion of the OLT, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.

The Notice of Appeal must:

- i) set out reasons for the appeal;
- ii) be accompanied by the fee of \$1,100.00 (or as otherwise prescribed by the OLT) per application, payable online through OLT e-file or by certified cheque or money order to the Minister of Finance.
